The EU, Sustainable Development and the Ocean: why are we here?

EU INTERNATIONAL COMMITMENTS AND OBJECTIVES

Commitment for multilateralism and the rules-based order. EU's global ocean leadership. UN's key role, 2030 Agenda, Treaties and international negotiations (BBNJ, Global Plastics Treaty, Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity), UN Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development.

EU POLICY FRAMEWORKS DRIVING OCEAN ACTION

European Green Deal, Global Gateway Strategy, EU Biodiversity Strategy 2030, European Ocean Pact, etc. + specifically in Africa: Africa-EU partnership, AU-EU Innovation Agenda, etc.

EU FINANCING INSTRUMENTS

Global Europe: Neighbourhood, Development and International Cooperation Instrument (NDICI)

Global action in figures (2021-2027):

- €79.5 billion for NDICI (sustainable development, environment, climate)
- €300 billion for Global Gateway (with a dedicated Global Gateway Africa-Europe Investment Package)
- €1 billion in ocean voluntary contributions pledged at UNOC3

The EU, Africa, a shared ocean: why ocean science and knowledge?

EU-AFRICA PARTNERSHIP ON OCEAN

Sustainable blue economies and ocean governance = a growing priority. Africa: 38 coastal countries. Ocean: climate, jobs, food, energy, security, identity. Momentum at regional level to protect and sustainably use ocean resources (STI AU-EU High-level Policy Dialogue, AU-EU Innovation Agenda, Agenda 2063, STISA 2034, Africa blue economy strategies).

OCEAN SCIENCE AND KNOWLEDGE

No life without ocean and marine life. No sustainable development without a healthy ocean. Data, science, cutting-edge technologies fundamental for informed decision-making, trust-building and cooperation, innovation. Digital ocean systems and information services are essential to support global ocean governance.

EQUITABLE PARTNERSHIPS (real impact)

Stronger partnerships, knowledge and capacity-sharing. Emerging thriving pan-African and international ocean community (trust, co-creation, locally driven innovation).

Global action in figures (2021-2027):

- €177 million for regional ocean programmes in Africa (new UNOC3 ocean voluntary contributions)
- €305 million for bilateral ocean programmes in Africa (new UNOC3 ocean voluntary contributions)

The EU, Mercator Ocean International, African institutions, the UN: why OPERA?

AFRICA REGIONAL CENTRES OF EXCELLENCE (ARCX) PROGRAMME

Advance science, technology and innovation STI to promote sustainable development in Africa. Increase STI capacities of African Regional Centres of Excellence. Five thematic areas related to green transition: ocean =» **Ocean Prediction Enhancement in Regions of Africa**. Historical background (GMES&Africa - build on what has been done and on existing forces/mechanisms.

FRAMEWORK: UN DECADE OF OCEAN SCIENCE FOR SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Science-informed policies, knowledge ocean-related gaps. Africa Region and Roadmap (Intergovernmental Oceanographic Commission of UNESCO IOC-Africa, regional collaboration). Mandate of Mercator Ocean International MOI (OceanPrediction Decade Collaborative Centre, Copernicus Marine Service, Digital Twin).

ONE INTERNATIONAL OCEAN PREDICTION COMMUNITY

EU + MOI + African organisations + UN. Calls for proposals (transparency). Links, connections, collaborative work between Africa's scientific and technological innovation networks and Europeans. Capacity transfer, expertise, technologies. Work together, deliver as one.

Global action in figures (2021-2027):

- €80 million for ARCX regional programme in Africa
- Including €7 million for OPERA (several calls for proposals) budget might be increased

To conclude...

Ocean leadership through action: OPERA the case for multilateralism, partnerships and science

We are no longer in a phase of awareness. We are in the era of action. OPERA is how we act – together.

NOW ITED RESOURCES STILL STANDING IN THE WAY

SDG14 most underfunded of all SDGs. Ocean-related ODA = only 1% of total global ODA. Significant gap between ambition and resources. Urgent need to scale-up financing (Global Gateway Strategy, blended finance, innovative financing mechanisms, greater mobilisation of the private sector, a critical partner in ocean sustainability).

MULTILATERALISM, EQUITABLE PARTNERSHIPS, SCIENCE AND OPERA

Ocean is a shared global resource. Sustainability cannot be ensured by any country alone. Science is needed to inform decision-making, create scientific knowledge and ocean-based tools. Multilateral cooperation, co-designed and inclusive projects such as OPERA, remain the most effective path to delivering on SDG14 and securing a healthy ocean for all.
